Introduction from the Director

What a year!

This Annual Report covers the year from 1 August 2017 to 31 July 2018 but for us here at Kettle's Yard it's hard not to feel that the year started on 10 February 2018, when we opened the doors to the new Kettle's Yard. So much work in the months and years before then were leading to that one moment. I would like to take this opportunity to consider the hard work that got us here; from tirelessly working with the architects and contractors to achieve the building that we now have, to the work we did to engage with our local communities during the closure period to keep Kettle's Yard alive in people's minds.

Within the first few months of opening we had welcomed the 100,000th visitor, thereby exceeding our target for the year.

There have been so many high points in the year; the opening exhibition 'Actions' with 38 artists, the Antony Gormley exhibition (the most visited in the history of Kettle's Yard), the Castle Hill Open Day in July and seeing the Clore Learning Studio constantly busy with drop-in activities at weekends and school and community groups during the week. Most rewarding for all of us has been the feedback from visitors and participants enjoying the new spaces and all they have to offer and, in many cases, discovering Kettle's Yard for the first time.

We could not have got to where we are without the support of so many: trusts, foundations and individuals who have given so generously and the unstinting encouragement of so many partners, stakeholders and colleagues. 

By Summer 2017 the major construction works had been completed and the building was handed back to Kettle's Yard. This was followed by a period of completing all fittings and finishes.

On 10 February 2018 we opened the doors to the new Kettle's Yard. Over 2,000 people poured through the doors on the opening day. The building was officially opened with a reading by pupils from The Grove Primary School.

The New Kettle's Yard includes:

- Two environmentally controlled galleries
- A new research space
- A café and shop

Exhibitions & Displays

During 2017 we continued to run a programme of off site activity whilst also preparing for our opening programme. Our last off site display, 'Sea to Shore: Paintings by Alfred Wallis and Christopher Wood' at the Fitzwilliam Museum closed in August. We launched Kettle's Yard with our most ambitious exhibition to date, a two-part show entitled 'Actions. The image of the world can be different'. It included 38 artists and extended beyond the gallery walls to encompass St Peter's Church and churchyard, online commissions and a new mural in Arbury, North Cambridge.

Then we presented the most visited exhibition in the history of Kettle's Yard, 'Antony Gormley SUBJECT'. For this site-specific exhibition, Gormley created works which engaged with the architecture of the spaces in daring new ways. As well as works based on his own body, the exhibition included a work composed of three steel bars that shot through the building joining the two gallery spaces and the public space in-between. A sculpture, which surprised visitors due to its composition from glass and thousands of small lights which created infinite viewing pathways, was also displayed in the Research Space.

Actions. The image of the world can be different, published February 2018

This publication marked the opening exhibition, 'Actions. The image of the world can be different', the first exhibition to be held at the new Kettle's Yard following its redevelopment. A 152-page fully illustrated book including short essays on each of the 38 artists included in 'Actions', a timeline, a reprint of the exchange of letters between Naum Gabo and Herbert Read (from which the exhibition title comes) and a contemporary exchange of letters between Sarah Lowndes and Paul Goodwin. Edited by Sarah Lowndes and Andrew Nairne with contributions from Paul Goodwin, Guy Haywood and Dr Jennifer Powell.

Antony Gormley SUBJECT, published June 2018

Published to coincide with the exhibition, the front section of this book is dedicated to sketchbook drawings, published for the first time, shown alongside photographs of Gormley's five works and interventions at Kettle's Yard. In her extensive essay, art historian Caroline Collier examines the exhibition and the artist's wider practice. Also included is a conversation between architect Jamie Fobert, curator Dr Jennifer Powell and Gormley discussing the work and the architecture of the new Kettle's Yard. Edited by Andrew Nairne and Dr Jennifer Powell, with contributions from the artist, Jamie Fobert and Caroline Collier.

House Guide, published February 2018

To coincide with the reopening a revised Kettle's Yard House Guide was published, edited by Dr Jennifer Powell.

Nature: A learning resource for Kettle's Yard, published January 2018

Nature is a teacher's resource designed to support learning activities for educators both before, during and after a school visit to Kettle's Yard. It focuses on the House and collection and explores the theme of nature through the philosophy of Jim Ede and the artists in the collection. Written by the Kettle's Yard learning team with contributions from Ellen Nowak, Rosie O'Donovan, Kyle Percy, Imogen Phillips, Sophie Smiley, Ceri-Anne van de Geer and Lucy Wheeler.

The Conditions for Creative Communities, published March 2018

The Conditions for Creative Communities is an overview of factors to consider when embarking on your own creative collaboration in your community. The 'conditions' were captured at a one-day symposium held at Tate Exchange, Tate Modern, hosted by Kettle's Yard in April 2017. Written and edited by the Kettle's Yard community team, Liz Ballard and Karen Thomas, with additional contributions from James Lees, Alan Soer and Dr Sarah Plumb. The publication was distributed to peers and partners and is available to download from our website.

Research and Dissemination

Kettle's Yard appointed Curator Dr Amy Tobin in January 2018. Under a new arrangement with the University of Cambridge's History of Art Department two members of the curatorial team are now based at Kettle's Yard and in the department (40% of Tobin's time and 20% of Head of Collection, Programme and Research, Dr Jennifer Powell). This arrangement has already strengthened connectivity between teaching and Kettle's Yard's collection and exhibition programme. It has also enhanced our public programme through closer connections to researchers and academics in the department as well as within the wider University.

Staff contributed to a number of external publications and events. For example, Amy Tobin published her co-edited book: Dr Amy Tobin, Jo Applin and Catherine Spencer eds., London Art Worlds: Mobile, Contingent and Ephemeral Networks 1960–1980, Pennsylvania State University Press, 2018; Dr Jennifer Powell was invited to lecture on her recent research into the artist Richard Pousette-Dart at Bowdoin College, Maine, US; Karen Thomas presented Open House practice and processes at 'Universeum' 2018 in Glasgow; Imogen Philips shared her research in a presentation in the field of community engagement and gallery education at the Sainsbury Centre for Visual Arts with the Engage Network in April 2018; Andrew Nairne was invited to chair a conversation titled 'Anni Albers and her Contemporary Legacy', with Rana Begum at Alan Cristea Gallery, London in conjuction with the Contemporary Arts Society.

Events & Projects

93 public events have been presented since reopening on 10 February 2018. Over 50 events were presented as part of the public programme for the opening exhibition, 'Actions', including eight conversations, debates and lectures, and a series of 'Actions' live events including a performance of two new works by Regina José Galindo in the attic of the House at Kettle's Yard and in the Front Court of King's College (pictured to the right).

The Antony Gormley exhibition was accompanied by an extensive programme too – including a series of 'Perspectives' talks, given by specialists from a range of subject matters within the University of Cambridge.

'Experiments in Art & Science' was a collaboration bringing three contemporary artists to the Gurdon Institute, in partnership with Kettle's Yard, funded by the Wellcome Trust. The three artists were David Blandy, Rachel Pimm and Laura Wilson. A public event to present work in progress took place at Kettle's Yard on 12 May 2018.

'As the scientists there noted, the purpose of the art may not be so much to precisely articulate new questions, but rather to help them to stand back and see their science through fresh eyes, and maybe find unexpected connections.

The hypothesis is that if you take three talented and curious young artists and show them some leading edge science that touches on diverse subjects, good things happen. Art happens.

Based on the short preview of the work being done which I attended, good things are already happening and I am excited to see how the collaboration evolves.'



Collection & Archive


Collection Conservation

During closure we completed extensive conservation work on many aspects of the collection which was kindly funded by the Friends of Kettle's Yard. This funding enabled us to conserve at least 55 fine art works, including paintings and works on paper and their frames, sculpture and textiles.

We were also able to conserve numerous other items in the collection including furniture, lamps, carpets and more. In all cases, we sensitively retained the original intentions of Jim Ede.

Archive

Unseen by most visitors, but vital for Kettle's Yard, is the new archive storage. We can now keep our important archive in the best conditions and can give better access to researchers.

The archive received 45 visits from researchers (over 30 research days), despite the disruption of moving from its temporary home at Wolfson College to the new purpose-built archive store at Kettle's Yard. Subjects of research have included the student loan collection, the artist John Blackburn, previous residents of Kettle's Yard, what Kettle's Yard offered student visitors in the 1960s, a literary perspective on Jim Ede's writings, and a mimetic collaboration examining the friendship between the artist Winifred Nicholson and the poet Kathleen Raine.

'Castle Hill Stories' is a resource that invited visitors to explore the people and places of Castle Hill through the Castle Hill Open Day partners' archives and collections. The resource provided an opportunity for visitors to engage with the many and varied histories of the area during Castle Hill Open Day through historical material and research carried out by the partners, from Roman remains to the lives and trades of late nineteenth- and early twentieth-century occupants of the area. Five of the partners contributed to this first iteration and we anticipate that it will be expanded and developed further in subsequent years.

The 2017/18 Kettle's Yard Chamber Music and New Music programmes included twenty concerts with a total audience of 1,711.

Chamber Music

In 2017/18 subscription tickets for the Chamber Music Series sold out in record time, in part due to the season opening with a concert by renowned cellist, Sheku Kanneh-Mason and his sister Isata. The season, curated by Justin Lee, opened at the Divinity School, St John's College and returned to the House at Kettle's Yard in February 2018. The return to Kettle's Yard was celebrated with 'The Jim and Helen Ede Concert' featuring the much-admired Heath Quartet, with Tom Poster. Audience members were clearly glad to be back in their normal habitat (with comfortable new chairs) and the season's concerts were regularly fully booked.

New Music

The New Music programme was curated by Kate Whitley and comprised five concerts held from March to June. Appropriately, the first of these celebrated the new Kettle's Yard's inaugural exhibition 'Actions' with the Ligeti Quartet playing *Lines*, composed by Whitley. The concerts were well received, drawing in audiences of a different demographic from those at chamber music concerts. Particularly memorable was the Aurora Percussion Duo, joined on 'junk percussion' by students from Impington Village College in South Cambridgeshire. In June, award-winning composer Samantha Fernando supplied possibly the youngest-ever audience member at a performance of her piece written in response to her first-born child. We are grateful for the support of The Radcliffe Trust, RVW Trust and Dr Shirley Ellis.

In Summer 2018 the Steinway grand piano, originally bought by Jim Ede in 1970, was fully refurbished to restore it to concert standard.

Learning

Formal Learning

One of the highlights of the formal learning programme is Kettle's Yard's long standing partnership with North Cambridge Academy. To celebrate the reopening, Kettle's Yard worked with the school to run a competition for students to design a poster. The winning posters and runners up were exhibited on our Castle Street windows. North Cambridge Academy was the first school to visit Kettle's Yard. 90 pupils visited on one day to view the exhibition, use the learning spaces and see all of the competition entries.

As part of the reopening, Heritage Lottery Fund supported the strengthening of relationships with schools. We achieved this by working with them both offsite and at Kettle's Yard during artist led workshops and visits. Through this programme we have established lasting connections with schools and teachers.

Following reopening we celebrated the production of the second of three teacher's resources, *Nature*, which was given to all Cambridgeshire schools. This resource follows our themes used in schools programme delivery and aims to be a source of research and support for teachers and educational professionals before, during and after a school visit.

Teachers

A series of teacher's evenings have been introduced to welcome teachers to the new spaces, to give them more information about the future programme and to enable stronger relationships with schools.

In 2018 we launched a new Teacher's Panel of education professionals to ensure that we reflect their needs as we refine our growing formal education programme.

80 schools visited Kettle's Yard between reopening and 31 July 2018, including 13 schools who had not previously worked with Kettle's Yard before.

Public programme

Since reopening, learning and community programmes have engaged with 13,485 participants.

Over 600 children, with their families and friends, attended our opening weekend drop-in workshops in the Clore Learning Studio.

Our new programme of events is well attended with fortnightly Studio Sundays regularly attracting approximately 80 participants. We have also introduced a new Early Years programme of artist led creative play workshops, which have proved extremely popular.

Our holiday programme for children and young people utilises our new digital equipment, this has included Virtual Reality and digital photography workshops.

Circuit: Young People's Programme

The Circuit group continues to be a vital part of our programme. This year we worked with a group of twenty young people aged 18-25, from a range of backgrounds, including art students from Cambridge Regional College and Anglia Ruskin University, and young people with additional needs who are not in education, employment or training.

The group directed, produced, filmed and edited a film, shown in the Kettle's Yard entrance during the 'Actions' exhibition, featuring interviews with eight of the 'Actions' artists. Circuit also interviewed Antony Gormley in his studios and produced a zine to accompany his exhibition, as well as curating a range of events including two 'Late' evenings and a digital workshop for Castle Hill Open Day.

Arts Award

We have developed three Arts Award Discover booklets that support school visits and are available as activity guides for members of the public to complete during their visit. 101 young people completed their Arts Award with us this year.

Casson & Friends

In July 2018, Casson & Friends, a professional dance and theatre company, worked on a community and artistic programme developed and performed at Castle Hill Open Day and as part of our 'Live' events in the galleries. Casson & Friends worked with 27 children from Mayfield Primary School and seven adults from Castle Ward, to develop dance works responding to the work of Antony Gormley. These works were performed at Castle Hill Open Day to over 470 people.

Outreach

2017/18 has seen the learning team bring the Kettle's Yard collection to a wide and varied audience through outreach work in our local community including a collaboration with the Gurdon Institute, a centre for research into the biology of development at the University of Cambridge. This project resulted in activities for families and children both at Kettle's Yard and at The Big Weekend.

Castle Hill Open Day was led by Kettle's Yard in partnership with Castle Street Methodist Church, Histon Road Cemetery, Murray Edwards College, Museum of Cambridge, St Giles' Church, Churches Conservation Trust at St Peter's Church and Shire Hall. Other partners included University of Cambridge Museums, Time Truck and Thirsty Biergarten.

We welcomed approximately 3,500 visitors to the event and recorded over 5,600 participations. Activities included tours and talks, an Arts Award Discover Trail, herb picking and tea making, plague themed activities, poetry reading, mat weaving, an exploration of the history of jelly, animation workshops and much more.

In the lead up to the event we worked with several creative partners who presented work on the day: Casson & Friends performed in the galleries and outside St Giles' Church, Eddington's toddlers and babies group designed a hanging seat for members of the public and North Cambridge Academy students made artwork that was displayed at St Giles' Church.

Community

This year, members of the North Cambridge community were closely involved with our exhibition, 'Actions. The image of the world can be different'. The International Women's Group collaborated with artist Melanie Manchot to create her new series, *The Ladies*, a commission made for the exhibition. The group enjoyed working with Manchot and visiting areas of the city they had not previously accessed. Street artist eL Seed created a mural situated on the side of Arbury Court. Local residents enjoyed the opportunity of meeting eL Seed and seeing his work develop over time.

Open House

Open House is a long-term creative collaboration between Kettle's Yard and our neighbouring communities in North Cambridge.

Kettle's Yard was grateful to be awarded funding from Esmée Fairbairn Foundation in February 2018 for three years to further develop our partnership work with our neighbouring communities in North Cambridge through our Open House programme. We are thankful for Paul Hamlyn Foundation's support over the past three years of Open House, and for the continued support from Cambridge City Council, our experiences of which we have been delighted to share at conferences, in articles and through a new publication, *The Conditions for Creative Communities*.

In 2017 we welcomed Harold Offeh, our third Open House artist in residence. Inspired by Jim Ede's handwritten inventory of objects in the House with annotated memories, Offeh worked with community groups and individuals to create a new collection of objects which were shared and used at the end-of-residency event, the Open House Gathering & Feast, attended by over 300 people.

Community Tea Parties

At a series of tea parties we welcomed local community groups to be amongst the first to visit the new Kettle's Yard, including Rowan, a charity supporting people with learning disabilities, and Cambridge Community Arts who support adults with mental health challenges through creativity. Following a tour of the House and new spaces tea and cake was served by social enterprise, Turtle Dove.

Community Days

Members of our community have been working closely with artists to collaborate on public events and devising artworks inspired by the exhibitions and collections at Kettle's Yard. The outcomes of these collaborations have been shared through our regular community days for visitors. Inspired by the Antony Gormley exhibition, a group of older people from North Cambridge worked over a five-week period with artist Lucy Steggals to devise creative activities for visitors to explore space through kinetic objects.

Tate Exchange

Kettle's Yard is a Founding Associate of Tate Exchange, a space for creative dialogue at Tate Modern. Our Curatorial Fellow, supported by the Artisa Foundation, Nicholas Osborne, led Kettle's Yard's programme in April 2018. Nicholas was inspired by the idea of community production and by the history of Arbury Carnival.

Arbury Carnival Committee members supported the event by welcoming visitors, taking over Tate Exchange and Kettle's Yard social media channels and assisting creative activities. Over 600 visitors were able to work with artists and the Committee to create squares of fabric decorated with ideas of what brings communities together. The event at Tate Modern welcomed visitors from across the globe, introducing them to Kettle's Yard for the first time.

Arbury Carnival


The theme for Arbury Carnival 2018 was 'Blue Planet'. The resulting patchwork of squares from Tate Exchange was further developed by students at North Cambridge Academy into large puppets which became the focal point of the Arbury Carnival procession.

Artist Anu Templar worked with children from The Grove Primary School to create carnival costumes inspired by a visit to the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, in particular their recent acquisitions of 'ghost net sculptures', contemporary works created by Torres Strait Island artists. The pupils created sea-creatures from upcycled materials and sourced plastic-free, biodegradable glitter to create a spectacular display at the carnival procession. The process supported all 56 Year 5 pupils at The Grove Primary in achieving their Arts Award Explore qualification.

Communications

Opening campaign

In December 2017 we launched the opening campaign. We developed a sub-brand for the reopening - everything turned yellow - the building played host to a new banner and window vinyl and the website took on an overlay announcing the 10 February date. In addition, printed marketing material was refreshed to encompass a new format What's On calendar, local flyers and other materials.

Digital

During 2017/18 the communications team developed new film content for Kettle's Yard, notably, three 'Art To Go' films, funded by THE SPACE. These are DIY art making films, led by artists, aimed at children and families. We also created a film to celebrate the reopening.

We have increasingly used Facebook to connect with new audiences, especially related to the events programme and other new areas of programming. The opening day and Antony Gormley exhibitions encouraged another boost of social media engagement, in particular the year saw a 63% increase in Instagram followers.

Following analysis, we optimised the website to make it more user friendly and fit to present the new programme at Kettle's Yard.

From 1 August 2017 – 31 July 2018 we had 639,221 unique pageviews to the Kettle's Yard website.

Prior to reopening we launched a new online ticketing system and in May 2018 we opened online booking for House tickets.



Volunteers

Our gratitude goes out to the many volunteers who supported Kettle's Yard activities and generously gave 2,100 hours of their time in 2017/18.

Commercial Activity

Venue Hire

Following the reopening week in February 2018 the primary focus was on implementing systems and procedures to support venue hire, developing paid tours and other events and working on marketing initiatives. Kettle's Yard is now listed as an associate member of MEET Cambridge, the official bureau for conference and event venues in Cambridge. The extensive media and press coverage for the reopening and subsequent exhibitions has provided a strong start to developing the profile of Kettle's Yard as a venue. Private House tours, in particular, have proved popular. In the first four months of operation we had over 40 tours and private hire bookings resulting in a small profit – an encouraging start.

Shop

The new shop got off to a flying start, exceeding the annual sales target for 2017/18 by 180%. There was a 130% increase in sales from 2014/15. We sold 3,400 House Guides and 22,300 postcards. The shop stocks a wide range of products spanning homewares, gifts, jewellery and ceramics. We have collaborated with designer-makers including Cambridge Imprint, I am Acrylic and Hadley Paper Goods on bespoke products inspired by the Kettle's Yard House and collection.

In May 2018 the new online shop launched, which saw a significant rise in online sales. The shop launched its own Instagram account @kettlesyardshop to promote our products and direct customers to both the physical and online stores.

Café

The café at Kettle's Yard is operated by Swift Kitchen Ltd, trading as The Garden Kitchen. Since its opening on 10 February 2018, The Garden Kitchen's menu offers both savoury and sweet items alongside popular favourites. The menus cater to a range of dietary requirements and always feature vegan and gluten free options.

The Garden Kitchen collaborates with Kettle's Yard on refreshments at events. At this year's 'Late' events, seasonal cocktails were served, there was a pre-concert dinner offer introduced at Chamber Music Concerts as well as their interval bar, and picnics were served at Castle Hill Open Day.

The café has received more visitors than expected in their first year and are pleased to continue to develop their offering alongside the successful development of the new Kettle's Yard.

Development & Funding

We are very grateful to all those who have supported projects, joined our Friends and Patron schemes, become corporate partners and donated on site.

Project Funding

This year we began our first year of a three-year project supported by Esmée Fairbairn Foundation *Open House: Evolving City* which enables innovative collaboration with our local community, through activities both on and offsite.

We received support from Cambridge City Council section 106a for a community project inspired by the Antony Gormley exhibition. We worked with dance company Casson & Friends, Storey's House and Mayfield Primary School to undertake performances across the site inspired by the exhibition and designed by our local community.

We created three 'Art to Go' short films supported by THE SPACE, allowing us to connect to audiences who may not be able to attend workshops and events.

Patrons

This year we introduced a new level of patronage, the Director's Circle. Director's Circle members provide much needed regular income that enables us to commission artists, plan conservation projects and deliver an innovative programme that strives to present some of the best opportunities to experience art anywhere in the world. We are delighted to have six founding members.

The Ede Circle continues to go from strength to strength with over fifty members. This year we presented a varied events programme, which included private views of 'Picasso 1932' and 'Robert Rauschenberg' at Tate Modern as well as the annual Ede Dinner with guest speaker Frances Morris, Director of Tate Modern.

The Friends of Kettle's Yard have had a strong year. The membership has grown to 931 and they continue to have a lively programme of events. The Friends contributed £50,000 to Kettle's Yard in 2017/18 and supported the extensive conservation project to get the House and collection ready for reopening.




